

Welcome to St. James Cathedral

This sacred land is the territory of several Indigenous Nations - the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishnaabe, with special recognition to the Mississaugas of New Credit. Anti-Black Racism: Shared Stories, Shared Pain, Shared Hope Panel Discussion: Wednesday December 1 from 7:00-8:30pm via Zoom

When forming our Social Justice and Advocacy Motion for 2021, many of you indicated a desire to hear the stories and experiences of those who have faced racism in the Church and elsewhere.
